Celebrating Our Community

he Eastern Oregon Museum is proud to share a community story that spans more than 150 years.

From its humble roots as a grange hobby show, the museum now houses thousands of artifacts that celebrate the rich history of the Baker and Powder valleys.

In 1953, Elkhorn Grange 908 initiated a hobby show. Visitors viewed hundreds of handcrafted tools, pioneer artifacts, farm implements and unique rural collections.

Interest quickly grew well

beyond the Grange's capacity. A larger, permanent location was needed. Fate stepped in — as it often does with history.

The Baker School District no longer had use of the Haines School gymnasium. Built in 1932, the building spans 5,700 square feet. Its arched roof, maple floors, dressing rooms, and office space presented hobby show enthusiasts with a perfect solution The building would not be left to decay, but instead serve as a place for the community to gather.

n the early 1930s, the Haines Methodist and Baptist churches "federated" their congregations. They met at the Methodist Church in the winter, as it was easier to heat. They worshipped together for about five years. The Ladies Aid supported community members in need — a need that was high due to the challenges of the Depression.

Museum Jumble Sale a huge success

ast September, the Eastern Oregon Museum hosted a jumble/garage sale. While no museum items were sold, a large quantity of treasures were donated by folks wanting to clean out a drawer or two, and help out a good cause. After three days of receiving and sorting, and two days of sales, the museum garnered \$4,000!

These funds arrived just in time. The museum front doors, pushing 50 strong years of greeting people, show signs of complete exhaustion. Volunteers have resorted to using a crowbar. The doors served us well, but they now must be replaced.

Costs have definitely increased. Every inch of the \$4,000 (plus \$2,000) will be necessary to replace the existing front door. The new doors will be installed before opening day.

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Ever wondered where Haines got its name?

Meet Israel David Haines

srael David Haines was born in Ohio on December 7, 1827.

His family moved to Missouri in 1844. In 1849, at age 21, Haines headed west, but then joined the Rifle Regiment, whose mission was to "cross the plains to Oregon to take possession of all the Hudson Bay territory and property, under the treaty made with the United States by Great Britain" (excerpt from his journal).

En route, Haines became sick with cholera but recovered — unlike many of his comrades.

By 1864, Haines was admitted to the bar. He began his practice in Silver City, Idaho. He spent the winter of 1865-66 in San Francisco, and on the return trip to Idaho in 1866, he traveled through Eastern Oregon and met old friends in Auburn. The next year he moved to Baker City, where he served as an attorney and political leader.

He ran herds of sheep in the Powder River Valley. His donation of 120 acres and the completion of the ORNC rail line laid the foundation for the Town of Haines.

Haines died June 19, 1892. According to the local newspaper, he was laid to rest with "the largest funeral for years" with a procession was over one mile long. His obituary reflected the loss of this respected local citizen:

"The city put on its garb of deepest mourning yesterday out of respect for one of its most honored citizens and pioneers who was laid to rest to 'sleep that sleep that knows no waking' in the city of the dead." Founding Board Members of the Eastern Oregon Museum, 1959


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In Memoríam...

Mac Kerns, 1934-2022, was born in Wyoming. His family moved to Haines in 1939. He attended grade school in Rock Creek and Muddy Creek, and graduated from Baker High School.

His job with the U.S. Forest Service took him to many locations but upon retiring, he returned home to Haines.

His passion for local history led him to the Baker County Historical Society and Eastern Oregon Museum.

On many occasions she and fellow volunteer Viola Perkins brought their sewing machines to the museum and spent their day restoring exhibit items. In her final season with the museum, Barbara repaired countless doll clothes that are part of the museum's extensive collection.


